

Message from the Chair



Mai I te waiheke o Huka
Whakarawhiti atu ki te mania o Kaingaroa
Te tihi o Maunga Kakaramea
Puta atu ki te pae Maunga o Paeroa
Ko Orakei Korako te Ukaipo
Tae rawa atu ki Pohaturoa.



Nga uri o Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa, tenei te mihi atu ki a koutou katoa. Nga kaumatua, e koro ma, e kui ma, e kare ma, kei te mihi, kei te mihi.

I am pleased to report on behalf of our Iwi Authority, another constructive year of engaging mahi which I provide brief outlines for below.

Our Runanga board have performed an outstanding job as your elected officers and Iwi ambassadors and they are deserving of high praise for their commitment and loyalty to the Iwi. The same applies to our Management team led by Blanche Reweti.

There have been many challenges that the board have had to overcome, particularly from our neighbouring Iwi who persist with attempting to usurp the Mana and Authority of the Iwi. This can cause stress and strain on the relationships with our neighbours however, if there is a single most important principle that the Runanga unapologetically protects and defends, it is our Identity and our Mana Whenua status over our rohe.

Our identity is our inheritance. Protection of our Mana Whenua status over our rohe, is our collective responsibility.

The Runanga takes this responsibility very seriously. We don't take this responsibility lightly and we don't take prisoners when dealing with individuals or collectives that threaten our identity and our Mana Whenua.

Our Responsibility - Protection of our Mana Whenua status

Ngati Tuwharetoa Claims Settlement Bill:

We have been actively engaged in discussions with the Crown and Ngati Tuwharetoa Hapu Forum (THF) over conflicting areas of interest.

- Non-exclusive Statutory Acknowledgement over the Waikato River from Huka Falls to Pohaturoa
- Non-exclusive Statutory Acknowledgement over the Rotokawa Geothermal Field,
- Ownership of the Rotokawa conservation lands including the Rotokawa lake bed,
- Ownership of sites surrounding Atahaka,
- Ownership of two sites referred to as the Aratiatia flats,
- Commercial Redress Items include Geothermal Wells RK6 and RK8.

The Runanga was able to reach a mutually acceptable agreement regarding most of the sites and mechanisms offered to Ngati Tuwharetoa by the Crown.

Those sites that we opposed and therefore could not reach agreement over included:

- Rotokawa lakebed and conservation lands,
- Non-exclusive Statutory acknowledgement over the Waikato River and Rotokawa geothermal field,

The Runanga along with Tauhara North 2 Trust, submitted to the Maori Affairs Select Committee, that the signed Deed of Settlement (which excluded the Rotokawa lakebed and conservation lands) should be recommended to be passed by Parliament, unamended. Ngati Tuwharetoa were seeking the opposite.

The Maori Affairs Select Committee agreed with our position and introduced the Settlement Bill in an unamended form.

This was a very pleasing result with a great turn-out by our people on the day of the Select Committee Hearing. I would like to thank the Tauhara North 2 Trust for an outstanding job assisting with bringing this result to fruition.

CNI Mana Whenua and TPT:

Progress has been frustratingly slow as Iwi politics is definitely up to no good.

Firstly, the new TPT board have been doing all they can to keep Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa out of the CNI even though we took a major lead role in the overarching settlement.

The Runanga have engaged a legal team to build the platform and evidential base for High Court action of which we hope to be engaged in before the end of the year. The Runanga has triggered a formal dispute with Te Pumautanga O Te Arawa (TPT) as a consequence of some members of the TPT board claiming that TPT has the Mana Whenua over CNI lands and not Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa.

This approach by TPT triggers both an Identity issue and Mana Whenua issue for us. Hence the reason we are preparing to take the battle to the High Court.

The process with be lengthy and expensive. It will require total focus and the resilience of our people if we are to succeed. It will require the same level of commitment our people took into the Ngati Tuwharetoa Claims Settlement Bill action. I therefore ask our people to prepare for a call to come together when needed. Tauhara North 2 Trust have kindly offered assistance here which is very much needed and therefore welcomed.

Again neighbouring lwi are attempting to claim into our area particularly from Tuhourangi Ngati Wahiao in this first instance. We fully expect others to do the same.

The Runanga can deal with this threat head-on through our legal team.

One area of greater concern however, is dissension within our own lwi ranks.

Certain individuals who are deliberately trying to undermine the Iwi and are working with the enemy. These individuals have come to our attention.

We have zero tolerance for disloyalty by our own who deliberately attempt to undermine the lwi for their own personal satisfaction. We will deal with this in a very deliberate and ruthless manner as there is nothing worse than disloyalty to the lwi by our own. Once we are able to verify the identity and their actions against the lwi, we will call them out publicly as that is where they are currently choosing to operate.

Please remain vigilant as cowards rarely reveal themselves openly and we simply can't afford to fragment or we will most certainly lose the fight.

Waiotapu Lease Rental Review and the High Court:

We have completed our adjudication process regarding the lease rental review of Waiotapu with Te Arawa Group Holdings Ltd. This has taken three years to complete with a very successful outcome with the Adjudicator finding in our favour, along with the High Court dismissing an appeal from Te Arawa Group Holdings Ltd. The term of the Waiotapu lease matures in June 2033.

Of note, Tuhourangi Tribal Authority are trying to claim an interest in the Waiotapu Thermal Wonderland and therefore, challenging our ownership of the Waiotapu estate. Tuhourangi Tribal Authority is trying to pursue their strategy of claiming Waiotapu from us through TPT.

The Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa Runanga Trust has legal title ownership over the Waiotapu estate and will therefore, vigorously defend ownership of the estate should we need to. We are 100% confident that Tuhourangi Ngati Wahiao will get nowhere with their aspiration of trying to usurp our ownership of Waiotapu.

Environment Court:

The Runanga supported the resource consent application by the Rotokawa Joint Venture (RJV), which is a joint venture partnership between Tauhara North 2 Trust and Mercury Energy.

The Tuwharetoa Maori Trust Board appealed the granting of the consent claiming that six Tuwharetoa hapu have equal Mana Whenua status to Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa in the Tauhara North Block.

An Environment Court hearing was heard in July 2017 where evidence from Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa and Ngati Tuwharetoa was received and heard by the Court.

Those who submitted evidence to the Court include myself as the Chair of the Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa Runanga Trust, Wikitoria Hepi-Te Huia as the Chair of Tauhara North 2 Trust at the time, Aroha Campbell as the CEO for Tahuhara North 2 Trust at the time, David Armstrong who is a principle historian from History Works based in Wellington, Buddy Mikaire as an independent Maori historian based in Tauranga and members from Mercury Energy Ltd.

This was yet another attempt to marginalise the Mana Whenua status of Ngati Tahu-Ngati Whaoa albeit via a resource consent process being heard by the Environment Court.

The Environment Court recently released their decision with our Mana Whenua status remaining unchallenged and the Court not ruling on the Mana Whenua status of Ngati Tuwharetoa.

From a Mana Whenua perspective, this is a great outcome for the lwi.

RJV are able to continue their work and we have kept Ngati Tuwharetoa not receiving Mana Whenua status by the Court.

Operations:

The Board of Trustees and staff have been working extremely hard throughout the year. The Te Reo program has been well attended and a core group of attendees meet weekly on a Tuesday.

Our Environmental team have initiated a number of fantastic projects. We are not able to mention them all as there are too many for this segment but I would like to make special mention of the Kohatu and ipou project which has been funded by the Waikato River Authority and implemented by our Environmental department.

So far, we have kohatu and ipou at Aratiatia, Orakei Korako, Waiotapu and the top of Maunga Kakaramea.

The next two kohatu and ipou will go in at the Mihi bridge beside the New Zealand River Jet and Huka Falls.

Tahu-Whaoa Group Holdings Ltd is actively looking at new commercial investment opportunities following the success of our investment in Tonga forestry. We are constantly undertaking due diligence in commercial property, tourism, the food and beverage sector and new technologie's with a particular interest in clean technology.

Given we are a small organisation; our market advantage remains our ability to seize opportunities coupled with speed of execution.

Finally I would like to once again, acknowledge my fellow trustees, staff, supporters, our whanau and Iwi and wish you all happy Matariki and good health.

Kaumatua Christmas function

Kaumatua Luncheon

This activity is held once a month and we have a core group of kaumatua/koroua/kuia who attend regularly, meeting at the Reporoa Community Hall. For each activity we invite an organisation to speak to our group, then we have lunch — speakers include ACC, Stroke Foundation, Te Puni Kokiri, Toi Te Ora/Heart Foundation, Rotorua Coffin Club, and Aged Concern Rotorua.





Reporoa Postvention Working Group: Formed in 2015, this group's membership includes local college, police, rūnanga, community nurses' manager, locals working with tamariki/mokopuna, Lakes DHB and Māori provider services. This year our group were involved in the review aimed at looking for at developing a resource(s) aimed at assisting whānau, friends, teachers and other adults to be able to have safe, supportive conversations about suicide with young people. The resource, "Connecting through Kōrero – Kōrerohia ngā mahi whakamomori ki te hunga taiohi" has been launched, and is available online via this link https://www.mentalhealth.org.nz/get-help/connecting-through-korero

Te Roopu Hauora o Te Arawa (Iwi Governance Group) — is an opportunity for Te Arawa iwi to be able have a governance relationship with the Lakes District Health Board. Ngati Tahu Ngati Whaoa has a representative on this roopu. Lakes DHB has a separate governance arrangement with Ngati Tuwharetoa iwi.

There has been a big push nationally and locally to review mental health services. Te Roopu Hauora o Te Arawa (TRHOTA) have contributed to the korero to the *National Mental Health Review Panel* and for the local redesign of the Rotorua Hospital's mental health services. I was also fortunate to join one of the groups looking at *Te Kuwatawata Mahi-A-Atua*, a contracted mental health service in Tairawhiti. Te Kuwatawata is



underpinned by the Mahi-a-Atua kaupapa using purakau to look at the characteristics and interactions of Tupuna Atua in order to understand our own interactions and behaviours. Te Arawa are looking at this concept towards adapting and creating a similar model for Lakes DHB mental health services.

Mātauranga / Education

Education Programme

Our contract of the past 2-years with the Ministry of Education has continued, and our education team is again supporting and encouraging our tamariki/mokopuna about the benefits and opportunities gained from learning. Last year our *teina roopu* put together this beautiful pukapuka about Ohaki Marae.



Reporoa Kāhui Ako - Communities of Learning

Trustees and principals of schools, educational and community representatives and iwi have undertaken to work collaboratively on shared priority areas to raise learner achievement. Each member is committed to building on the cultural heritage of the whenua/rohe so that our tamariki can experience success and have pride in their cultural identity, and that tamariki who identify as Māori can experience success as Māori. The Rūnanga have had their first wānanga with primary school teachers to kōrero tuku iho, purakau, whakapapa. This is a start towards developing our iwi mātauranga to be used in our schools curriculum.

the Runanga.








Mahinga Kai Distribution Surveys
